School of Business Organizations

Now that you have all gotten settled into Truman life, it is a great time to research and join an organization! Truman has over 250 student organizations on campus. Within the School of Business there are eight organizations. These organizations provide students with leadership skills, valuable experiences in their chosen professions, and the opportunity to be involved and interact with students of similar interests.

Alpha Kappa Psi (AKPsi) is a co-ed professional business fraternity that is open to all students studying or having interest in business, accounting, or economics. Its mission is to develop well trained, ethical, skilled, resourceful, and experienced business leaders.

TruMarketing provides members with the opportunity to get involved in various business and community relations activities, such as professional speakers, fundraisers, and creating local advertisements and projects with local businesses. It is open to any major with an interest in marketing, advertising, communications, and business.

Beta Alpha Psi (BAP) is an international scholastic and profes-

sional organization for Financial Information Professionals. The primary objective of the organization is to encourage and give recognition to scholastic and professional excellence in the business information field. BAP is open to Accounting, Finance, and Economics majors.

Beta Gamma Sigma is the AACSB's honor society for the business and accountancy program. Members must rank in the upper 7% of their junior class, upper 10% of their senior class to be invited to join. Truman offers a \$1000 scholarship to one BGS member each year.

Delta Sigma Pi (DSP) is a professional fraternity open to all accounting, business, and economics majors. Truman's chapter was established in 1978 and is one of the most prominent chapters in the nation, maintaining strong programs of professional development, community service, and fundraising activities.

National Association of Black Accountants (NABA) addresses the professional needs of its members to build leaders that shape the future of the accounting and finance profession with an unfaltering commitment to inspire the same in their successors. NABA is concerned with enhancing opportunities for minori-

ties in the accounting, finance, and business related professions.

Phi Beta Lambda (PBL) is a professional, social, and service organization, promoting better understanding and appreciation for the principles of business management and good fellowship among its members and other organizations, while engaging in worthy service activities. Membership is open to all students.

Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) is a nonprofit organization that gives students the tools to learn the free enterprise system in a real working situation. Diane Shi, a senior Finance and Economics major from China, had an externship last spring break. She externed with Shelter Insurance in Columbia, MO.



What did you do during your time with Shelter Insurance?

I researched and evaluated investments in F5 networks, Citigroup, Avon, and Riverbed. I practiced using Bloomberg software and conversed with JP Morgan Analyst about the markets and stocks.

What did you do about living arrangements for the week?

I stayed at a hotel with another extern and split the hotel costs with her. She was also externing with Shelter Insurance.

What was the most valuable experience you had during the week with Shelter Insurance?

I was able to learn more about stock purchasing and portfolio management.

Do you suggest someone partake in this program and if yes, why?

Yes! It is a very valuable experience! You get to learn what professionals do on a daily basis, what skills you need for certain positions, and get to network with alumni.

What advice do you have for future applicants?

When applying, state exactly where you want to go – be specific. Write what you need from the experience, so you get something out of it.

Interning at a Government Agency

The last Peer Mentor newsletter explored interning at a corporation. Another career path business majors can pursue is one in a government agency. The United States government has job opportunities at every level (county, state, federal) and every geographic location. This flexibility is one of the biggest benefits of a government job. Remember that working for the government does not necessarily mean working in law enforcement or for public office. Museums, agencies, and even the White House have internship jobs for students. Also, while Washington DC houses a lot of the opportunities, each state has a state department and its own agencies and branches that hire interns year-round. Truman has a Missouri Government Internship program every spring in Jefferson City at the capital. This is just one example of where a business degree can take you.
