## ABC's of Job Searching

**A: Accomplishments**—What have you excelled at in life? When you figure it out, tailor your job search to the talents that help you achieve your greatest accomplishment. If you're looking for a job, you might as well search for something that matches up with your strengths.

**B: Benefits**—Not sure you should accept a job because of pay that's lower than you expected? Keep in mind that salary isn't the only form of compensation. Don't overlook unique benefits like flextime or tuition reimbursement.

**C: Coordination**—The days of blanket résumé mailings and multiple cold calls are long gone. You need to research, network, improve, and educate. Finding a job isn't just about the perfect résumé or a strong interview. It's about all aspects of your job search working well together. Make sure you pay attention to all facets of your quest for a new career.

**D: Directions**—Want to be on time for your interview? Map it out ahead of time. Sure, you can use your GPS but be sure it's right. Getting lost on the way doesn't make for casual pre-interview conversation. It only reflects on your lack of preparation and your minor-league professionalism. Once you check in 20 minutes late for an interview, you're in for an uphill battle.

**E: Eye Contact**—If you're interviewing for a position, it's essential to maintain eye contact at all times. It shows you're paying attention and are actively engaged. Ask any recruiter: A job prospect who glances out the window expresses a lack of interest in the position.

**Study Abroad** – More often than not recruiters are looking for students who have international experience. According to CBS, only 14% of students who graduated last year studied abroad. If you study abroad, you will have an experience that provides you with many items to talk about during interviews and looks great to recruiters. It will also give

you a unique experience and help you grow personally in many ways.

**Complete an Internship** – This is an obvious one and definitely makes you more marketable when you are job hunting. It gives you actual work experience and can potentially lead to a job after graduation. Companies also like to see that another company liked you also, so when they make that decision to hire you, they have a recent reference.

**Become an Expert in Something** – This one might surprise you, but it is very important. When you have one skill that you are known for it gives you a leg up over the competition.

In addition, it gives you something interesting to talk about during interviews, will help you win awards, or set you apart in the workplace.

**Get Good Grades** – This is a given. Some companies will not even look at your resume if you have below a 3.25. So keep studying!

Grant's daily tasks included integrated scheduling between the U.S., Korea, and Israel, forecasting when different tools would be needed for the planes, and research in areas such as international tax codes and tooling.

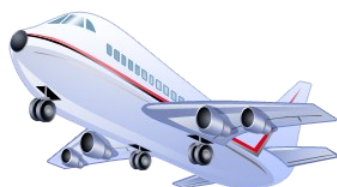
This strong international presence turned out to be one of his favorite parts of the internship. He was able to sit in on telephone calls between Israel and Korea biweekly and from this he gained valuable real world experience. Other than the international side of his work, he also enjoyed the many opportunities he was given to meet people and see other sides

## 5 Apps to Help College Students Save Money

### 1. Mint

Mint is an app that allows users to track spending and manage their money. The app automatically enters and categorizes transactions from all accounts (checking, savings, credit cards, investments) and has a manual entry option for cash purchases. Mint also includes a feature to create customized budgets. This free app for iPhones and Androids is password protected to ensure security.

### 2. Red Laser

This barcode scanner and QR reader app searches for the best prices for an item among online and local retailers. Red Laser lists product descriptions, reviews, and nutritional information to help users make informed decisions. It also suggests alternative products and accessories for products viewed. It is free and compatible with iPhones and Androids.

### 3. GasBuddy

GasBuddy finds the cheapest gas in the area by searching for city/zip/postal code. Users can report or update gas prices to help other users save money. The free app can be used with iPhones and Androids.

### 4. Campus Special

This free app for iPhone and Android users lists deals and coupons for places near a student's university. Users can conveniently redeem these coupons directly from their phone. Campus Special also provides quick access to phone numbers, addresses, and maps for restaurants/businesses around the university.

### 5. CardStar

CardStar is a free app that allows users to store all of their loyalty cards, reward cards, and membership cards on their phone. This ensures that people will never miss out on rewards or discounts again because they don't have their reward card with them. CardStar is compatible with iPhones and Androids.
